AI for Health Video Competition

How do I apply?

- 1) Follow @CHGlobalHealth on Twitter.
- 2) Complete the [video essay application form](#) where you need to provide:
 - a. Provide the **URL link (password free)** to your **2-5-minute video** exploring AI and health from a young person's perspective (see below for details).
 - b. Include a **250-word (max) statement** on your motivations for entering the competition.
 - c. Complete the **informed consent form**, which highlights the terms and conditions of the interview, Chatham House data protection and privacy information, and the risks. You will then be given an option to agree and consent.

The application will **open at 9:00 am (GMT) on Friday, the 18th of December 2020** and will **close at 9:00 am (GMT) on Monday the, 4th of January 2021**.

Task

Your government has renewed its commitment to achieve SDG3 and is looking for ways to use AI to improve young people's health. Imagine your government has hired you as an expert to look for ways to adopt Artificial Intelligence (AI) solutions to improve young people's health outcomes. You can choose between the following options to focus on in a 2-5-minute-long video:

Option 1:

From your perspective, explain the main **opportunities** you see for AI to improve young people's health, the **challenges** with AI adoption for health and which AI interventions for health the government should **prioritize**.

Option 2:

Explain the governance structures needed to implement AI solutions for health. What does the government need to do to improve inclusive governance for AI adoption? The video must consider the link between Artificial Intelligence, young people and SDG3.

Entries will be judged by a panel of Chatham House staff on the originality and clarity of their videos. However, **we do not expect a professional video**. The video can be created in any style or format you see fit. Please note that **the candidate must consent to the video potentially being used for future purposes**.

To send your video essay entry, please upload to **YouTube** and **share the URL (password free)** to the video in the email. Only one entry per person. The winner will be contacted by **Friday, the 15nd of January**. Unfortunately, we are not able to offer feedback on entries.

Candidate criteria

Be between 18 and 28 years old

Have a proven interest in AI and health
Have a commitment to youth participation in international affairs

Video checklist

The video is between a minimum of 2 minutes and a maximum of 5 minutes
The language for recording is **English**
The video explores the opportunities, challenges, priorities and governance structures of AI and health
The video considers the link between AI, young people and achieving Universal Health Coverage
The video is **horizontal**
The lighting is good, and the sound is clear
The content is presented in a **concise** way with **direct eye contact** if self-recording

Terms and Conditions:

1. Entries must be in English and submitted by sending to the email address above.
2. Employees and immediate family members of employees of The Royal Institute of International Affairs (RIIA) or anyone else professionally associated with this competition are not eligible to enter.
3. Entrants warrant that their entries are not offensive, defamatory or otherwise unlawful, and are unique, have not been plagiarized and do not infringe the intellectual property rights or any other rights of a third party.
4. The judging panel's decisions are final, and binding and no correspondence will be entered into.
5. There is no fee to enter the competition.
6. No responsibility for late, incomplete, corrupt or lost entries will be accepted.
7. The RIIA may, at its absolute discretion, cancel, suspend, or vary the competition.
8. Exclusion of liability: the RIIA is not responsible for (i) any incorrect or inaccurate information used in connection with the competition; or (ii) failures or errors which may occur in the administration of the competition.
