

APPLICATION

- **Foreign** fishing vessels and fishing support vessels.
- Fishing conducted in marine areas and "fishing related activities in support of IUU fishing" -

any operation in support of, or in preparation for, fishing, including

- landing
- packaging
- processing
- transhipping or
- transporting

fish that have not been previously landed at a port, and provisioning personnel, fuel, gear and other supplies at sea.



USE OF PORT

"Use of port" to be denied where IUU fishing is suspected/established includes:

- landing
- transhipping
- packaging
- processing

fish that have not been previously landed and other port services such as refuelling and resupplying, maintenance and drydocking.

FRAMEWORK – STEP BY STEP



- Port entry requirements and authorization
- Deny port entry
- Deny use of port before inspection in certain circumstances
- Inspection in port
- Deny use of port after inspection
- Needs good intelligence, communications, information sharing – nationally, regionally and globally

FRAMEWORK - GENERAL



- Elaborates information requirements for vessel reporting and inspection reports
- Requires reports/information to be transmitted
- Provides guidelines for inspections and training of inspectors
- Elaborates the role of parties as flag States
- Provides for assistance to developing States
- Serves as a minimum standard for global harmonization of port State measures that will have strong economic and legal impacts for IUU vessel operators.

ROLE IN AGREEMENT



- 1. RFMO-related terms defined:
 - "RFMO"
 - "Conservation and Management Measures"
 - "IUU fishing"
- 2. Tools for assessment of evidence of IUU fishing, e.g.
 - IUU/Authorized Vessel Lists
 - reporting, CDS
- 3. Communication and notification requirements at all stages (entry, inspection, denial of use)
- 4. RFMO to develop procedures to identify "ports of non-compliance"
- 5. Role of the RFMO Secretariat

ROLE AND ACTIVITIES OF RFMOs

IMPACT OF AGREEMENT



1. Performance Reviews

2. Strengthened, cost-effective PSM measures

3. Strengthened linkages, e.g. comprehensive MCS system

4. RFMO port State measures are binding on members

5. Support for developing State members

CASE STUDY

F/V PREMIER

Demonstrates the exercise of sovereignty, extraterritoriality against a F/V registered and owned in South Korea by Dongwon Industries.



November 2011 –May 2012	Operating in Liberian waters
Charged with unlicensed fishing in Liberia territorial sea – forged license	
May-November 2012	Operating from Abidjan, Ivory Coast
November 2012	Videoed in South Africa, en route to Indian Ocean
January-March 2013	Licence denial: Kenya, Mozambique
	Offloading denial: Seychelles
April 2013	Licence renewal denied: Tanzania
	Offloading denial: Mauritius (twice)
VECCEL DAID FINE TO LIDEDIA: O MUIS DE LIC DOUGUE	

VESSEL PAID FINE TO LIBERIA: 2 Million US Dollars, PREMIER offloaded in Sri Lanka, returned to Busan, South Korea, changed name

CASE STUDY

F/V PREMIER

IMPACT

- Fine
- Denial of fishing opportunities by three countries
- Denial of port use by two countries
- Port fees, fuel costs
- Loss of economic benefit from catch

COOPERATION

2 RFMOs, 7 port/coastal States, 1 market State NGOs (Trygg Mat Foundation, Stop Illegal Fishing, Fish-i Africa)

LEGISLATION

Liberia, Kenya, Mauritius, Mozambique, Seychelles, Tanzania
