14:00 - 15:00 BST Session 1: Africa: The World's Youngest Continent

Africa's population is projected to double over the next three decades, reaching 2.5 billion people by 2050. The continent will have the largest number of people below the age of 24 of any region worldwide: nearly twice the young population of Southeast Asia.

While this shift is often described as a 'time-bomb' for issues of poverty reduction, education and healthcare, less focus is given to the incredible prospects it provides for Africa's already rapidly growing environment of new creative technologies, industries and services - as well as the positive implications for governance and political expression. The opportunity therefore lies with Africa's young people to deliver on the huge potential of the coming decades - but what are the key trends and openings that will allow remaining challenges to be addressed, and what role can the foreign relations of African countries play in this future?

Why do we need to know about China and its ambition in becoming a technological champion? What is Huawei, and why is the Chinese government so keen to roll out 5G both domestically and internationally? Many countries are preparing to move from 4G to more advanced 5G mobile networks. Download speeds 10 times faster than today will radically change how we work, communicate and stream videos. This is important, as more things - from self-driving cars to fridges, baby monitors and fire alarms become connected to the intranet. The concern is that state-sponsored hackers could use these devices, which often have weaker security features, as back doors into strategically vital networks.
